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#### **At-a-Glance Summary**

# Community Served



The Community Health Needs Assessment identified the whole of Kitsap County as the primary service area. Kitsap County is one of the smallest counties in Washington State in terms of land area with a population of approximately 280,900 in 2022, an increase of 21% since 2000. Children and youth 18 years old and younger represent 20.8% of the population, which has been decreasing slightly over time, while the population aged 65 and older (20.5%) has been increasing. A little less than three quarters of Kitsap residents are non-Hispanic White or Caucasian (71.9%). Hispanic and Latino residents are the next largest group representing 9.4% of the service area's total population. The third largest racial group in Kitsap is people identifying as two or more races (8.2%).

#### Significant Community Health Needs Being Addressed

The community health needs the hospital is helping to address and that form the basis of this document were identified in the hospital's most recent Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). Needs being addressed by strategies and programs are:



- · Behavioral Health
- · Access to Health Care
- · Pregnancy and Births
- · Chronic Disease
- Basic Needs

#### Strategies and Programs to Address Needs



The hospital intends to take actions and to dedicate resources to address these needs, including:

**Behavioral Health:** Explore ways to further integrate physical and behavioral health services in acute inpatient, emergency department, and primary care settings, including follow-up care services for patients discharged from the emergency department. Support programs that break down barriers to receiving quality mental health treatment. Explore initiatives to expand access to behavioral health services among youth, low-income community members and people who are experiencing homelessness.

Access to Health Care: Support programs that help those who are unhoused, uninsured, or under-insured obtain quality, affordable care. Continue expansion of the NW Family Practice Residency toward building primary care capacity in Kitsap County. Broaden engagement with organizations providing basic needs support to vulnerable communities. Increase intra-agency coordination toward improved patient outcomes. Continue to support the healthcare workforce pipeline by partnering with schools and community organizations. Explore strategies to improve language access.

**Pregnancy and Births:** Increase community education and access to maternal and infant health programs. Partner with public and community based organizations to strengthen community resources. Explore partnerships and programs to reach those experiencing a first pregnancy.

**Basic Needs:** Provide partnership, support, and resources to community based organizations addressing poverty and food insecurity. Identify and activate internal strategies to increase SNAP enrollment. Explore strategies to improve language access within the hospital system. Implement edible food recovery through St. Michael Medical Center to reduce food insecurity and food waste.

**Chronic Disease:** Expand community education programming to prevent and manage chronic disease with an emphasis on healthy eating, diabetes, and breast cancer. Develop partnerships with community based organizations who provide programs and resources to high risk population and with food systems organizations to increase access to healthy food.

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# Anticipated Impact



**Behavioral Health:** VMFH intends to strengthen linkages to receiving behavioral health care in the wider community and to increase capacity for behavioral health care.

**Access to Care:** VMFH intends to increase the number of community members enrolled in insurance, especially Medicaid, and will reduce language access barriers. VMFH will expand the workforce development pipeline in healthcare fields.

**Pregnancy and Births:** VMFH intends to increase community education and access to maternal health during the prenatal and postnatal pregnancy stages.

**Basic Needs:** VMFH intends to increase the number of community members enrolled in SNAP, reduce food insecurity, and improve language access within the hospital system.

**Chronic Disease:** VMFH intends to increase access to healthy food and nutrition education. VMFH also intends to increase access to diabetes education and breast cancer screening with high risk, vulnerable populations.

# Planned Collaboration



**Behavioral Health:** VMFH will partner with, Kitsap Mental Health Services, and various behavioral health agencies and community-based organization to achieve our goals.

**Access to Care:** VMFH will collaborate with Project Access NW, Conifer, wrap-around service providers, long-term care facilities, community based organizations, and transportation providers to achieve our access to health care goals.

**Pregnancy and Births:** VMFH will partner with numerous community based organizations, Kitsap Public Health District, local providers, and the tribes to achieve our pregnancy and births goals.

**Basic Needs:** VMFH will partner with the food banks, Kitsap County, the Veterans administration, and numerous other community based organizations to achieve our basic needs goals.

**Chronic Disease:** VMFH intends to partner with the Kitsap Public Health District, the WA Food Coalition, the WSU Extension, the Marvin Williams Recreation Center and other community based organizations to achieve our chronic disease goals.

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# **Our Hospital and the Community Served**

#### About VMFH and St. Michael Medical Center

Virginia Mason Franciscan Health is a nonprofit health system with over 200 sites of care, including a total bed count of 1,605 at our 10 hospitals, 211 Outpatient Centers, 12 Urgent and Prompt Care Clinics, the Franciscan Hospice House located in Tacoma, the Bailey-Boushay House located in Seattle, and the Benaroya Research Institute located in Seattle.

St. Michael Medical Center is a 262-bed hospital in Silverdale, Washington with a planned expansion to add an additional 73 beds. St. Michael Medical Center employs 1,798 employees making the Medical Center the largest private employer in Kitsap County. In fiscal year 2022, the Medical Center generated 73,795 inpatient days, outpatient visits of 360,130, and 70,124 emergency care visits. Community benefit, the cost of charity care, uncompensated care, and community programs totaled over \$36.3 million in FY22. The Family Practice Residency generated an additional 20,000+ patient visits with 30 private exam rooms. 60% of graduating residents stayed in Kitsap County to practice medicine. Supporting Kitsap County, VMFH has invested \$540 million to build the new hospital, Cancer Center, Medical Pavilion, and the Family Practice Residency.

## **Our Mission**

St. Michael Medical Center's dedication to assessing significant community health needs and helping to address them in conjunction with the community is in keeping with its mission. As CommonSpirit Health, we make the healing presence of God known in our world by improving the health of the people we serve, especially those who are vulnerable, while we advance social justice for all.

## Financial Assistance for Medically Necessary Care

St. Michael Medical Center delivers compassionate, high quality, affordable health care and advocates for members of our community who might have difficulty accessing and paying for necessary medical care. In furtherance of this mission, the hospital provides financial assistance to eligible patients who do not have the capacity to pay for medically necessary health care services, and who otherwise may not be able to receive these services. 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## Description of the Community Served

St. Michael Medical Center is located in Silverdale, WA. A summary description of the community is below. Additional details can be found in the CHNA report online.

The St. Michael Medical Center Community Health Needs Assessment included information for all of Kitsap County, WA. This community has 280,900 residents. A little less than three quarters of Kitsap's residents are non-Hispanic White or Caucasian (71.9%). Hispanic and Latino residents are the next largest group representing 9.4% of the service area's total population, compared to Statewide, where Hispanic and Latino account for 14.5%. The third largest racial group in Kitsap is people identifying as two or more races (8.2%). The population aged 65 and older is increasing.

Among all individuals five years and older, Kitsap County had a higher proportion of the population who reported speaking English at home (91%) compared to the State. The top languages spoken at home other than English were Spanish (2.9%) and Tagalog or Filipino (1.8%). While many residents are bilingual or multilingual, some report that they either do not speak English or speak English less than "very well". In 2021, it was estimated to be about 2.6% of the population or about 6,719 people. Residents whose first language was Korean or Chinese had the highest proportions reporting speaking English less than "very well", while those who speak Spanish or Tagalog had the highest overall numbers of people.

Life expectancy has been increasing statistically significantly in Kitsap County since at least 2000. A baby born in 2023 can expect to live about 83 years. However, some populations have statistically significantly lower life expectancies. Men have lower life expectancies than women by more than 4 years. Life expectancy also varies by race and ethnicity and geographic area of residence. Pacific Islanders have the lowest life expectancies in Kitsap, followed by American Indian and Alaska Natives, and Black and African Americans. Residents of Bremerton and South Kitsap (80 ½ years) have statistically significantly lower life expectancies than residents of Bainbridge Island (87 years).



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## **Community Assessment and Significant Needs**

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# **2023 Implementation Strategy**

## Creating the Implementation Strategy

St. Michael Medical Center is dedicated to improving community health and delivering community benefit with the engagement of its management team, board, clinicians and staff, and in collaboration with community partners.

This implementation strategy was created with input from multiple VMFH leaders and staff. Departments participating in the development of the implementation strategy included Mission, Community Health, Community Relations, Administration, Care Management, Behavioral Health, the Family Birth Center, the Family Practice Residency, and the Board of Directors.

Community input and contributions to the CHNA and this implementation strategy included discussions with external community groups, the Kitsap Public Health District, community-based organizations, advisory councils, and other health systems. Additional feedback sessions were conducted with the Kitsap Veterans Advisory Board, The Kitsap Health Equity Collaborative, The Kitsap Immigrant Assistance Center clients and staff, and the Kitsap County Aging and Disability Council.

The programs and initiatives described here were selected based on their alignment with identified community health priorities, resources available to address these challenges, and availability of partnerships to reach underserved populations.

St. Michael Medical Center believes that program activities to help address significant community health needs should reflect a strategic use of resources and engagement of participants both inside and outside of the health care delivery system.
